On March 12, 1957 Sauk Village was born. This community of 55 houses joined together and became incorporated. The first Village Board meeting was held in a model home. The first order of business was to approve the

expenditure of a log book for the Village Clerk to keep the official records.

On March 12, 2007, students from Rickover Junior High School and St. Marks School were sworn in as Village Officials for the evening. One order of

business was to approve expenditures of \$523,118.14.



Students from Sauk Village Schools have been participating in Student Government Night for 14 years. They are able to spend the day with Village Officials seeing how the day to day operations are handled. Students meet with the various department heads and find that today, with over 3500 homes and almost 12,000 residents, it takes many people to keep the Village operating.

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News from the Sauk Village Fire Department



January 1, 2007 marked the start of a new Illinois law regarding carbon monoxide detectors. ALL buildings that have sleeping areas; use fossil fuels for heat and/or have an attached garage must have a carbon monoxide detector within 15 feet of the sleeping areas. Hey-that's probably close to all of us. Whether or not you have an attached garage, you're probably using natural gas for heat and cooking. So that means this law applies to you.

The Sauk Village Fire Department supports this law along with the State of Illinois and the Office of the State Fire Marshal. Carbon Monoxide (CO) is the "silent killer." Over two hundred people in the U.S. are killed annually by CO and thousands more are sickened. Don't let yourself or your loved ones become a statistic. Buy a CO detector (or 2) and install them today. As for installation and operation, take the time to read the owners manual. There's valuable information in it. If in doubt, feel free to call the Fire Department during normal business hours at (708)758-2225. If your CO detector starts alarming or you have nausea and a headache- call 911 immediately. Evacuate your home, but leave the doors and windows closed, so we can determine the problem a little easier.

The Sauk Village Fire Department DOES NOT have carbon monoxide detectors available.

There's always something going on at the Fire Station. We have a number of new recruits that will begin their Firefighter State Certification class soon and more new recruits keep coming in. This is an excellent opportunity for you to get you foot in the door of a rewarding and challenging field. Whether you're just looking to serve your community, or interested in the Fire Service as a possible career choice, the Sauk Village Fire Department is a good place to start. Our only requirements are that you be a Sauk Village resident 18 years old or older, have a valid drivers license and a high school diploma or GED. You will need to pass a background check and a physical prior to starting. Once you're on board, the challenge begins. The training alone is a huge commitment, so feel free to stop by the station at 1804 E. 222nd Street or call at (708)758-2225 during normal business hours to ask questions before applying. Applications are available at the fire station or Village Hall.

New Animal Ordinance



New rules for pets. No dog shall be tethered (chained) for more than three (3) hours during any twenty four (24) hour period.

When walking dogs no person under the age of 18 shall walk a dog that has been deemed "vicious" or dangerous under any applicable provision of the law on any street or public way in the Village. No person under the age of 14 shall walk any dog weighing in excess of 59 pounds on any street or public way in the Village.

The license fee for a dog or cat that has not been neutered or spayed shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.00) to be paid to the Village Clerk prior to the issue of a license. Be sure to bring proof from your veterinarian stating your animal is neutered or spayed.

Potholes—The Spring Time Headache

Spring is in the air and with it the ground thaw. Every winter when the ground freezes from snow and rain seeping in to the soil it creates a frost line, which can go down several feet, and the end result is the ground heaving up. This causes stress on the pavement, usually cracking it. As the season moves on we get several up and down surface thaws which can cause the road to settle back down. In most situations the street will not form potholes, but were there is heavy traffic, or cars driving on the edge of the road surface the potholes form and they spread as traffic hit them or the plows scrape over them.

The goal of the Public Works Department is to keep the roads open and safe, and temporarily repair all potholes until spring/summer were we can do a more permanent repair. We are asking the public to help us in the locating process because you, as the resident drive down the street regularly and if you see a pothole starting to get bad please contact us at Village Hall, (708) 758-3330 and we will repair as soon as the weather permits. Fighting After School

Fights after the school dismiss are on the rise. This Department has implemented a specific team to handle just these incidents and arrests are being made. One you are off of the school property and commit a battery (a fight) you will be arrested and begin or add to your juvenile record. PARENTS, please speak with your children about this serious matter. Criminal Damage to Property, Disorderly Conduct as well as Battery will result in an immediate arrest. Serious injuries to both police staff and the children may result from these activities and will not be tolerated. Children arrested and transported the police station will require a parent for release if a release is an option. Walking in the street, as always seems to be the other large problem with dismissal. Tickets from \$50 - \$750 will be issued to the child AND the guardian in these cases.

Stop Blocking Traffic

LEFT HAND TURN ON TO SAUK TRAIL:

Drivers exiting northbound from Cornell and Prairie who pull in to the eastbound lane and STOP! waiting for the westbound traffic to clear while blocking the eastbound traffic, will be ticketed with a moving violation Obstructing the flow of traffic in this way backs traffic up and into the I394 intersection causing problems. You must make sure that from a stopped position on the side street, that you are able to start your movement and turn and end in the proper direction without interfering with other traffic including but not limiting the oncoming traffic to stop or even slow. The Illinois Tollway and the Dan Ryan will continue to be nightmares for the southland this year. Illinois will begin using photo radar in work zones starting in July. Second Offense tickets are \$1,000 with license suspension. Beginning in July the State of Illinois will use speed cameras in areas designated as "Work Zones". Anyone caught by these devices will be mailed a \$375.00 ticket for the first offense, but the second offense will cost \$1000.00 and come with a 90 day license Suspension.

This summer plans are being made to continue with road and other infrastructure repairs in Sauk Village. The Village has received another CDBG federally funded grant for streets, curb and sidewalk repairs.

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SEVERE WEATHER WARNINGS From ESDA

It is that time of the year again when severe weather can strike with little or no warning. I'd like to remind all residents to be mindful of the weather at all times.

A **<u>severe thunderstorm watch</u>** means conditions are favorable for a severe thunderstorm.

A **severe thunderstorm warning** means a severe thunderstorm is imminent.

A **tornado watch** means conditions are favorable for the development of tornados.

A **tornado warning** means a tornado has been spotted near or in the vicinity. A severe thunderstorm can produce a tornado with little or no warning.

Lightening can strike from miles away. Do not be misled by a clear sky when storms are around the area. Each year, lightening strikes kill 75-100 people.

Everyone needs to have an emergency plan and emergency supplies for up to 3 days. You should have a portable radio with spare batteries, candles, lighters, flashlights, medications, water, books, puzzles, etc. Parents need to educate their children on the dangers of severe weather. Children should be informed of emergency plans, what to do if they are caught outside in severe weather and most importantly, children need to know they should not panic during severe weather.

Remember your pets as well. Animals left chained or caged have nowhere to go for safety.

Once severe weather has passed, many people go out to survey the damage. Do not go near downed power lines, trees that are hanging, etc. Do not call 911 unless you have a life threatening emergency. Following a severe storm, many people inundate the police departments 911 center with telephone calls for trees down, no power, flooded streets and more. Although a tree down is important, please use the non emergency number and remember, please be patient as you will not be the only person calling and they will get to you as soon as you can. Further information packets regarding severe weather are available at the Village Hall.

News from the Sauk Village Fire Department



As this article is being written, it's about 40 degrees outside - and it's the middle of April! Hopefully by the time you read this in May, Spring will finally be here, and with Spring comes some helpful safety tips.

Everyone loves a good barbecue. Before you fire up that grill for a busy summer, do a visual and physical (touch) inspection of your propane hoses and bottle. Check for cracks, dry rot, and general wear and tear. Replace pieces if necessary. Also check to make sure all fittings are snug. When using the grill, keep it in an open area away from the house and other structures, and keep the kids at a distance- even when you're done cooking.

With warmer weather, you can count on kids being more active outside. As of mid-April, we've already had one kid hit by a car on a side street. Watch the speed limits and be mindful of kids out playing.

It's also that time of year where we get the itch to start those outside construction/remodeling projects don't forget to consult Village code officials, and use safety equipment when running power tools. Extension cords are always an issue. Use an approved extension cord with your tool and make sure it's in good working condition.

On March 5th, the Fire Department added a second full-time administrative position. Captain Rich Atwood, who was the Department's part-time training officer, is now full time Monday through Friday. He's been with the Sauk Village Fire Department for 11 years and has been in the Fire Service for 14 years. He's looking forward to seeing the department continue it's forward growth.



Beginning May 1st, the Fire Department added a part-time Firefighter/Apparatus Operator position to help out during the weekdays. So, if you know anybody anywhere that is a State Certified Firefighter II and a certified Fire Apparatus Engineer, please have them come to the station for an application. And as always, we're always hiring "paid-on-call" or POC firefighters willing to come from their homes to respond. POC applicants do have to be Sauk Village residents. Again, applications are available at the Fire Station or Village Hall.

On March 1st, the Sauk Village Fire Department was pleased to welcome Chaplain Lee Gatzke to our staff. As a Fire Department Chaplain, Lee is responsible for the emotional well-being of our firefighters and citizens in times of crisis. Chaplain Gatzke brings with him years of experience working with the American Red Cross and other mission fields. He also worked extensively in Louisiana during the Hurricane Katrina disaster under some of the worst conditions. The Sauk Village Fire Department welcomes Chaplain Gatzke and we've already had to put him to work.

TOWING CHANGES

The Sauk Village Board has adopted an ordinance for persons that have their vehicles towed due to criminal and ordinance related offenses. Starting May 1st 2007 vehicles that are towed by the Sauk Village Police Department & Code Enforcement will only be released after a fee is paid to the Village prior to paying the tow operator for related costs. The following is a short version of the ordinance and its fine schedule.

Those vehicles towed for:

Abandoned autos

\$100 fee



Stranded and left in roadway obstructing traffic \$100 fee

Driving with suspended license \$100 fee

Other traffic offenses that require towing \$100 fee

Narcotics-related offenses \$500 fee

Narcotics-related criminal activity \$500 fee

Prostitution related criminal activity \$500 fee

DUI

\$500 fee

Gang-related criminal activity \$500 fee

Loud music when a vehicle is towed \$500 fee

Other specified criminal activity not specified \$500 fee

These fees are separate from any and all towing costs. These fees can only be paid during Village Hall hours m-f 8a - 5p and Tuesday night 7p - 9p.

- ✓ When leaving for vacation, notify your trusted neighbors and family to watch the house and collect mail and newspapers.
- ✓ Keep dust to dawn light sensors on for a bright area around your home during the night.

- ✓ Put a house watch on your home with the police with key holders and emergency phone numbers.

Street Sweeping Schedule for 2007

The weeks beginning April, 16 May 21, June 18, July 16, August 20, Sept. 17 and October 18 street sweeping will begin following the garbage day route.

Remember there is no parking on the street between the hours of 7:00 am and 3:30 pm during the day of your garbage day pick up.

Street sweeping may get ahead or behind this schedule.

Hydrant Flushing

The hydrants will be flushed in the following sections of town on the specified dates:

April 4-South side of Sauk Trail and West of Torrence extending to Deer Creek.

May 2-North side of Sauk Trail extending to Carlisle Estates.

June 6-Eastern section of town; east of Torrence and south of Sauk Trail.

July 11-South side Sauk Trail west of Torrence extending to Deer Creek.

August 1-North side of Sauk Trail extending to Carlisle Estates.

Sept. 5-Eastern section; east of Torrence and south of Sauk Trail.

Oct. 3--South side; Sauk Trail west of Torrence extending to Deer Creek.

Actual flushing will begin at 11:00 p.m. of the previous night, continuing through the morning until the area has been completed.

Residents should refrain from washing whites during flushing and for at least 24 to 36 hours after flushing.

COMMUNITY DEVEL-OPMENT

- Please be advised you are now required to obtain building permits for siding, gutters & downspouts, windows, soffits, trim, fascia & roof replacement including shingle replacement. Any contractor doing work in the Village limits is required to have a contractor's license. This is to protect the homeowner. Feel free to contact the Building Department before starting work and we will assist you and inform you on what is needed.
- Due to West Nile it is extremely important to keep your grass cut under 8" front and back. Residents who choose not to maintain their lawns will receive a ticket every 24 hrs.
- Please do not leave discarded old tires laying around for water to collect in them. This is another problem that we face with mosquitoes and it's an eyesore to other residents.
- If you own a pool please make sure you maintain it. That means run the filter and add the proper chemicals to keep the water clear. If the pool is not in use it has to be covered and drained to avoid standing water. If you have to back wash the filter or drain the cover it has to be drained to the front of the property not in your neighbor's yard. If we receive complaints about any pools that are not being maintained we will strictly enforce this and you will receive tickets every 24hrs.
- Be considerate to your neighbors if you have papers, litter and debris in your yard. Please make sure you pick it up, it only takes a few moments and it makes a big difference in the appearance of our Community.
- Please store garbage/containers towards the rear of the property, it's unsightly
 - to have garbage containers overflowing in front of houses. Make sure they are covered to prevent dogs, cats, raccoons, opossums and other rodents from getting into the container.
- Please be advised there is no parking on a nonhard surface – all vehicles have to be parked on concrete or asphalt.

New Municipal Building – Senior Citizen Center Veterans Memorial Groundbreaking



On May 9, Mayor Roger Peckham and Village Board broke ground on the new Municipal Building Complex, Senior Citizen Facility and the New Veteran's Memorial on land just north of the existing Municipal Building on Torrence Avenue. Representative George Scully, representatives of Senior Citizens Groups and Veteran's groups joined the Village Officials on this historic occasion during Sauk Village's 50th Anniversary year.

The new complex, which is scheduled to open early next summer will house the Village offices, as well as a new community meeting room. In addition, a

new larger senior citizen facility will be included, as well as an outdoor, long awaited, memorial to our Veterans.

Once the senior citizens are able to move into their new quarters, the existing Senior Citizen Recreation Building will be used entirely for the young people of our community and will include some upgrades and remodeling. The existing Village Hall/Police Station will be used by the Police Department and ESDA to meet their needs for additional space.

The new facility, as well as the upgrades to the existing buildings will cost approximately \$6.5 million dollars. The entire cost will be paid for by the impact fees generated by the development at the Logistic Center at Sauk Village Business Park west of Illinois 394.

The Veteran's Memorial will be funded by the various 50th Anniversary events that are behind held throughout the year, including the sale of memorial bricks which will be a part of the memorial itself.

News from the Sauk Village Fire Department



Summer is finally in full swing and the Fire Department has a few good things to report.

On June 12, 2007 Firefighter Mike Fuoss was promoted to the rank of Engineer. Getting to this position is a challenge. To even think about it, a member has to complete and pass the Illinois Fire Marshal's Firefighter certification. Typically, a member has to get a few years under their belt before we trust them enough to drive the expensive big trucks. But, since Mike came on the department in May, 2005, he has demonstrated the desire to grow with the Department and has tackled every thing we threw at him. Mike started his driver training last year and successfully passed the Illinois Fire Marshal's Fire Apparatus Engineer course. Being an Engineer means a lot more than just getting the fire truck from one place to another. An Engineer, besides being responsible for the safe transportation of the firefighter crew, is also responsible for supplying water to the hoses, getting water from a hydrant and making sure his truck is running right. It's a big job and we congratulate Mike on his promotion.

On June 12, 2007, the Village signed a contract for the Fire Department's new 100 foot Aerial Truck. This truck will replace the existing 65 foot Snorkel that has provided 27 years of valuable service. It generally takes 14 months for a truck of this nature to be built and delivered. The new aerial with its 100 feet of reach will be of great assistance with our growing industrial complexes and multi-family buildings. It will also have additional features that will make it more well-rounded to serve the Village. For example, the truck will house an additional set of auto extrication tools and it will have a 750 gallon water tank, which qualifies this truck to be used as a fire engine too- not just an aerial device. The Fire Department's fleet is old by Fire Service standards and the Mayor and Village Board have been great about doing what they can to help us modernize our equipment to better serve you. This new aerial is just one more step in the right direction for the community.

For the last several months, the Police and Fire Departments have been working together to institute the use of a new computer aided dispatch and record keeping system. This program by New World Systems will make the dispatching of police and fire calls more efficient. It will also help dramatically with the record keeping of calls, personnel, equipment, training, and buildings in town. From the Fire Department's side of this program, part of the computer aided dispatch feature is a "rip and run" report. When the Fire Department receives a call from dispatch, a detailed report will print out in the Apparatus bay. This report will detail any stored information on the address of the call, including building details, key holders, and call history for the address. Further more, each Fire Department vehicle is already equipped with a lap top computer. This software package will allow Fire Department Officers to access the database and pull up additional information on the address while we're at the scene making fire operations more efficient and saving valuable minutes.

As you can see, the Sauk Village Fire Department is committed to improving and moving forward with our ability to serve you- the citizens of Sauk Village. Have a safe summer!

FROM THE DESK OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

It's time to address some of the issues that our department has been running into this spring/summer

- We have an overwhelming amount of residents that are not maintaining their lawns. Please be advised the ordinance states grass/weeds can not be over 8 inches in height. That also includes weeds growing in fences and around the general vicinity. We have strictly been enforcing this & have issued several hundred tickets. When cutting your grass please do not cut it into the street, when it rains it washes down to the sewers and the sewers become clogged which causes flooding on the street.
- Residents cannot sell candy or any other food items from their home. This is becoming a big problem & it is prohibited. It is also a violation of the hawking and peddlers ordinance. If we catch you, a Lo-Ticket will be issued to bring you in front of a Markham Judge.
- All pools must have a fence around them whether it's a kiddie pool or a full size pool. This is for the safety of the children. We do not want to receive a call that a child has drowned. Also, if a pool has a filter system it cannot be plugged into an extension cord, it has to have its own GFI outlet. With extension cords you run the risk of getting an electrical shock. Pools need permits.
- Garbage can placement must be to the rear of the property. It's unsightly to have garbage stored in the front of your house overflowing with lids that can't be shut.
- Please be reminded Building Permits are required for most work being done to the home. Please call the Building Department if you have any questions.
- All items above are ordinances that we are and will strictly enforce. Please comply with the Village ordinances and you will not be hearing from us.

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News from the Sauk Village Fire Department



Want to attract attention? Buy a big sign! The Sauk Village Fire Department recently had a new light up marquee sign installed on the west side of the station. The new sign replaced our old barely legible wooden sign. When we were trying to figure out what to put on the marquee for it's inaugural message, we went with "Volunteer Firefighters needed- Apply within."

As a result, we've had several very promising new recruits come through the door. These new applicants were subjected to our new hiring procedure. In addition to being 18 or older, Sauk Village residents, having a high school diploma or GED, and passing a background check, all new applicants are given a reading comprehension exam and a physical ability test to see if they can perform basic firefighting skills. After this, the applicant is sent for a physical. The applicants are then encouraged to start attending training sessions. Once the physical results come in, assuming they are physically fit, the applicant is sworn in by the Village Clerk and becomes an official member of the Fire Department as a "New Recruit" or "Probie" for short. Then the real fun begins!

On August 7, 2007, the Sauk Village Fire Department took delivery of a new 16 foot trailer. This addition to our fleet will house equipment for hazardous material responses. In July, the Fire Department received a generous donation from Roadway Express. Roadway recently disbanded its on-site "haz-mat" response teams at three major trucking terminals and donated all of the equipment to us. The Sauk Village Fire Department in the past had to rely solely on mutual aid from other communities for any large scale hazardous materials incident. We now have the capability of initiating a more efficient response as well as being a better resource to our neighbors.

Fire Prevention Week, 2007 begins the week of October 8. The theme this year is "Practice Your Escape Route." None of us want to think about a fire in our homes. The loss of our home and possessions is bad enough to consider, but failure to plan can lead to the loss of life and that is something nobody should have to go through. Plan an escape route out of your house in the event of fire. Review the plan with your family and practice the plan.

Please be advised you are now required to obtain building permits for siding, gutters & downspouts, windows, soffits, trim, fascia, furnace/ac replacement, electrical upgrade, sheds, driveway, pool, concrete work, decks, fence, sewer clean outs & roof replacement including shingle replacement. This is a guideline not all items are listed. Any contractor doing work in the Village limits is required to have a contractor's license. This is to protect the homeowner. Feel free to contact the Building Department before starting work and we will assist you and inform you on what is needed.

• Permit fees have been increased their as follows: \$50.00 for the first \$1000.00 and 2% for the remainder of the cost. Anyone that does not obtain a permit before work begins will be charged **double** the permit fees. If you need a dumpster these are the only companies that have a scavenger license to work in town.

- With fall approaching we recommend you have your furnace cleaned and certified, also make sure you check your smoke/co-detectors to insure that they are functioning properly.
- If you own a pool please make sure at the end of the season it has a proper pool cover on. All pools that are not in use have to be covered.
- Please store garbage/containers towards the rear of the property, it's unsightly to have garbage containers overflowing in front of houses. Make sure they are covered to prevent dogs, cats, raccoons, opossums and other rodents from getting into the container.

- Any resident that received a property maintenance letter time is running out for the work to be

POLICE DEPARTMENT

SCHOOLS ARE OPEN!

Please watch out for our kids now that schools are open for the year. Mornings and early afternoons are the most congested times for kids being out. And as much as we try to get them to stay on the sidewalk, they seem to find themselves in crosswalks and the streets. Please be careful and continue to contact the Police Department when kids are in the roadway.

BASKETBALL NETS AND HOOPS

The Police Department has been forced to remove basketball nets in many different areas of town. Nets left on the sidewalk and parkways are removed by Public Works at the Police Departments direction. Hoops are to be kept and used on *private property only*, not the sidewalks or streets.

PUBLIC WORKS

The Public Works Department is preparing for its second and final branch pickup for the season. All branches must be at the curb no later then Sept 9, 2007. 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Housing Authority News: Winter Safety Tips

WITH THE COLDER MONTHS OF THE YEAR NOW UPON US, THE FOLLOWING ARE A FEW SAFETY TIPS FOR YOU AND YOUR FAMILY TO KEEP IN MIND.

CANDLES - Always put candles in non-tip candleholders before you light them, and do not burn candles near decorations or displays. Keep candles well away from curtains, and never put candles in windows or near exits. Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Never leave a room with a candle burning or within reach of small children.

CARBON MONOXIDE - Consider installing detectors on every level of the home, near sleeping areas where the audible alarm can be heard. If the alarm goes off, exit the home and call 911. Recognize the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning and exit the home immediately if you suspect the presence of carbon monoxide. Call 911 from a safe location.

CHRISTMAS TREES - A fresh tree is green. Fresh needles are hard to pull from branches. When bent between your fingers, fresh needles do not break. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin. When the trunk of a tree is bounced on the ground, a shower of falling needles shows that tree is too dry. Place tree away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources. Heated rooms dry trees out rapidly, creating fire hazards. Cut off about two inches of the trunk to expose fresh wood for better water absorption. Trim away branches as necessary to set tree trunk in the base of a sturdy, water-holding stand with wide spread feet. Keep the stand filled with water while the tree is indoors. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways. Use thin guy-wires to secure a large tree to walls or ceiling. These wires are almost invisible. Avoid smoking near flammable decorations. Avoid wearing loose flowing clothes - particularly long, open sleeves - near open flames - such as those of a fireplace, stove, or candlelit table. Never burn candles near evergreens. Burning evergreens in the fireplace can also be hazardous. When dry, greens burn like tinder. Flames can flare out of control, and send sparks flying into a room, or up the chimney to ignite creosote deposits.

ELECTRIC SPACE HEATERS - Space heaters need their space! Keep combustibles at least three feet away from each heater. When buying a heater, look for a thermostat control mechanism and a switch that automatically shuts off the power if the heater falls over. Heaters are not dryers or tables! Don't dry or store

objects on top of your heater. Keep children and pets away from space heaters. Never leave children in a room alone when a space heater is in use.



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Housing Authority News: Winter Safety Tips

ESCAPE PLANS - Develop an escape route with two exits from every room. Pick a meeting place in a safe location so all family members can be accounted for. Call the fire department from a cordless phone, a neighbor's home or another safe location. Never re-enter a burning building for any reason. Practice your home escape plan every six months and consider practicing it at night when most home fires occur.

FIREPLACES - Keep fire where it belongs - in the fireplace! Have chimneys inspected by a professional before the start of heating season. Make sure you have a screen large enough to catch flying sparks and rolling logs. Clean your chimney regularly - creosote build-up can ignite your chimney, roof and the whole house! Store cooled ashes in a tightly sealed metal container. Cardboard boxes and paper bags can quickly catch fire. Only burn materials appropriate for a fireplace, never burn trash or paper, burning paper can float up a chimney and onto your roof or into your yard.

FURNACES - Have your heating systems inspected by a qualified service professional at least once a year. This inspection should include lubrication and cleaning, replacing filters, a check of belts and thermostats and having vents cleared of obstructions, as necessary.

GENERAL PREPRATION - Have extra blankets on hand, and ensure that everyone in your household has a warm coat, gloves or mittens, a hat and water-resistant boots. Use products only for their intended purposes. Hair dryers aren't intended to thaw frozen pipes, dry clothing or warm bedding. If you use an electric blanket to keep warm on a cold night, follow the manufacturer's instructions and make sure you turn it off and unplug it when it's not in use. Never tuck an electrical blanket in.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS - Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety. Identify these by the label from an independent testing laboratory. Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Discard damaged sets or repair them before using. Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house, walls or other firm support to protect from wind damage. Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord. Turn off all lights on trees and other decorations when you go to bed or leave the house. Lights could short and start a fire. Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. The tree can become charged with electricity from faulty lights, and any person touching a branch could be electrocuted! To avoid this danger, use colored spotlights above or beside a tree, never fastened onto it!

Keep "bubbling" lights away from children. These lights with their bright colors and bubbling movement can tempt curious children to break candle-shaped glass, which can cut, and attempt to drink liquid, which contains a hazardous chemical.

SMOKE DETECTORS - Have one on every level of the home. Consider installing a smoke alarm near bedrooms and on each floor of your home. Test it monthly. If it has a 9-volt battery, change the battery once a year.

The Public Works Department salts and plows the village streets, village ordnance states No parking on village streets after 2" snow or till completely removed. As plows clear the streets, they push the snow toward the curb. Inevitably, the snow will be pushed in front of driveway entrance. Unfortunately, there is no way to avoid this. Each resident must assume responsibility for clearing enough of this snow to allow them to get in and out of their driveway, without putting it back into the village street.

Residents who are incapable of removing this snow themselves or who do not care to do so may choose to hire a teen or plow service to assist them.

The highest priority of the Public Works plow drivers must be to make the streets as safe as possible for vehicle traffic and for the passage of emergency vehicles in the event they need to get to your home.

There are 27 center lane miles of street in Sauk Village that the plows must keep clear and salted. While we regret inconvenience we trust you will understand.









Tips from the Sauk Village Fire Depart-

October is always a busy month around the fire house. The week of October 7 was **National Fire Prevention** Week. Through the course of the week, Fire Department personnel did nine presentations at the all of the Sauk Village public schools as well as two day care centers. On Sunday, October 14, the Fire Department hosted its annual open house in conjunction with a pancake breakfast. The event was well attended and everyone left with full bellies and lots of fire prevention related give-a-ways. Before the month was over, several station tours were conducted including a special visit from the entire third grade from **Strassburg School**.

The theme for Fire Prevention Week this year was "Plan Your Escape." During the school presentations, all of the children were given junior firefighter badges. They were told that with that badge comes responsibility. They had to take home with them what they were taught during the presentations. According to the National Fire Protection Association, approximately 65% of the US population has an escape plan to get out of their home in case of a fire. Only about 33% actually practice that plan. Having a plan is a good start, but families need to practice those plans. Make a game of it, make it fun - but know this is a serious and important activity to do with the whole family. Have two ways out of every room and designate a safe area outside the house for everyone to meet at. 
With the holiday season fast upon us, there are several fire safety tips and reminders to keep in mind. Candles remain one of the most common causes of residential building fires. Do not leave candles unattended or leave them in places where children or animals can knock them over. Remember if you go out - blow out!

If you use a real Christmas tree, purchase one that's fresh. Shake all the dead needles out before bringing it in your home and water it daily to keep it fresh. Examine your tree decorations. Make sure strings of lights are in good shape, wires are not frayed, and that the plugs are in good condition and connected properly.



Cooking and baking are popular holiday traditions. Keep flammable objects such as towels and paper products away from the stove. Keep young children away from the stove and oven. Use something like a cookie sheet to prevent those holiday pies from dripping in the oven.

Besides the holidays, cold weather brings certain hazards too. Remember to keep portable space heaters at least 3 feet away from walls, furniture, and anything else that might come in contact with them. Furnaces should be inspected annually by a certified technician. "Tis the season" for carbon monoxide alarm responses from the fire



detector in the immediate vicinity of the sleeping area.

This may sound like a lot of stuff, but this is the health and safety of you and your family that we're talking about. Make it a safe and joyous season!

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Tips from the Sauk Village Police Depart-

THE HOME SAFETY SURVEY:

Take a few minutes and look this list over. These tips are intended to make your home safer.

- Make sure the lights on the outside of your house work, and are they on at dusk and off at dawn?
- Don't leave items near windows on the outside of your home that can be used as a ladder or stepstool into your windows.



- Make sure your doors and ground floor windows have locks that work and keep them locked when you're not home or sleeping.
- Get to know your neighbors.
- Make sure bushes that are against your home are trimmed at the bottom as to not become a barrier for someone to hide behind and break in.
- Install motion censored lights on the outside of your home and make sure they are high enough so the "bad guys" can't reach up and unscrew the bulbs.
- o Don't leave spare keys hidden on the outside of your house. Most bad guys know where these places are!
- o If possible, stagger your routine, don't always leave and return to your home at the same times.
- If you are away for a few days, arrange to have your mail and papers picked up.
- Place your house on a house watch when on vacation or away from your home for extended periods of time.

Make time to walk around your home, inside and out. Think like a burglar and notice what things will lead to theft, damage and burglary and make simple changes to correct them. The best defense is a good offense and common sense.

DON'T ADVERTISE

After the Christmas Holiday, one seems to follow up the festive date by cleaning the house and preparing for the New Year Holiday. In many cases the first thing to go to the curb for garbage collection are all the boxes that the wonderful gifts came in. To a burglar, this is an index of which houses now contain which brand new products and they even list the brand, size and special features! Break down your cardboard boxes and place them inside your garbage containers or recycle them. Don't make your home a target!

HOLIDAY SEASON WARNING:

During the Holiday season many people travel from home to meet family and friends, leaving their homes empty and unprotected. When leaving your home for any period of time please consider the following ideas before you leave...

- ✓ Have a neighbor, family member etc., pick your mail and newspapers up.
- ✓ Place some lamps on reliable timers.
- ✓ Have someone check your home every day for anything out of the ordinary.
- ✓ Put your house on a "House Watch" with the Police Department.
- ✓ Don't leave outside lights on the entire time you are away. This tells a thief that your not home to shut them off.
- ✓ Items that are not insured and cannot be replaced should be removed from the home when practical.
- ✓ Have a key-holder available in case of an emergency and make sure the Police Department knows who this is. (broken pipes, etc)
- ✓ Make sure your blinds and or shades are closed. Displaying items in your home through windows is a really bad idea!


